#### LETTER FROM OUR FOUNDER

At the beginning of 2022, schools and community based organizations were still recovering from the Covid-19 pandemic. Vision Quilt used this time to plan for future work.

Following the tragic Uvalde Shooting of innocent elementary students in Texas, Vision Quilt publicized our free multidisciplinary toolkit entitled, "Addressing Gun Violence: Creating Visionaries, Storytellers, and Community Activists" to schools and nonprofits across the U.S.. A major article featuring our work was written by The Guardian in their section entitled, "Guns and Lies".

Vision Quilt also received praise from key community leaders for its work in schools and its high visibility for the Peace In The Streets Banners which now span 1.6 miles along International Boulevard in East Oakland. Many of the students we work with live in unsafe neighborhoods with limited mental health resources. One of the most strategic decisions Vision Quilt made in 2022, was to offer self care tools to our teacher and community leader partners so they can offer practical resources to their young people.

In 2023, we hope we can raise funds to expand from a volunteer organization to a nonprofit with paid BIPOC leadership.





Vision Quilt met with educators in 9 different states in response to their interest in the FREE curriculum Vision Quilt developed with teachers from Lighthouse Community Charter School in Oakland.





Designed plans for a Freedom School Saturday program, an African-centric cultural enrichment program in East Oakland including classes in African and Black History and culture, African dance and drumming, cooking, playwriting, violence prevention arts-based activities and restorative circles.

Facilitated a workshop for teachers on Tools of Resistance at the Oregon Jewish Museum and Center for Holocaust Education in Portland Oregon

Met with teachers and administrators at 4 schools in East Oakland to plan implementation of AGV in Spring of 2023.




# PEACE IN THE STREETS


Expanded the Peace in the Streets Vision Quilt Banner Project to 1.6 miles along International Boulevard In Oakland
