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
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Letter from our Executive Director

BIPOC nonprofits, educators, activists, and artists in Portland, Oregon are beginning to partner with the newly formed Vision Quilt Team in Rose City.

Thanks to the eight-year commitment by <u>Lighthouse Community Public Schools</u> in East Oakland, key parts of the multidisciplinary curriculum entitled "<u>Addressing Gun Violence:</u> <u>Creating Visionaries, Storytellers and Changemakers"</u> were implemented in 2023 in their two middle schools with a finale exhibition seen by over 600 people. Vision Quilt documented the impact of this work on principals, students and community members. A film was created so that other schools and community-based organization can see an overview of this FREE curriculum in the hopes that they will adopt it for their communities.



Program Overview

Vision Quilt's programs harness the power of art and storytelling to address gun violence and promote healing and social change within BIPOC communities. Our workshops provide participants with a platform to think about their experiences, express their visions for safer communities, and engage in dialogue about root causes and solutions to gun violence. These workshops involve youth and survivors directly impacted by gun violence.

Our exhibitions showcase the powerful artwork created during our workshops, amplifying the voices of those affected by gun violence and sparking conversations within the community. These exhibitions serve as opportunities for dialogue, education, and advocacy, engaging a diverse audience in discussions about the impact of gun violence and strategies for prevention.

Community dialogues provide a space for individuals to come together to discuss pressing issues related to gun violence, share personal experiences, and brainstorm solutions. These dialogues aim to foster understanding, empathy, and collaboration among community members and empower participants to become advocates for positive change within their communities.



Our Impact Summary







In 2023, Vision Quilt made significant strides in its mission to empower BIPOC communities and combat gun violence through workshops, exhibitions, and community dialogues. Key achievements include successful partnerships with organizations like Lighthouse Community Public Schools, which expanded our reach and impact in East Oakland. Our collaboration with Youth Alive! resulted in impactful summer workshops. The creation of large panels by Massachusetts artis, Marge Barrett-Mills, served as powerful symbols of community resilience and solidarity. Vision Quilt forged partnerships on Bainbridge Island and in Portland, collaborating with organizations like P:ear to expand its reach and impact. These partnerships facilitated the organization's efforts to engage with new communities and provide support to those affected by gun violence. Additionally, Vision Quilt strengthened its capacity by hiring Diana Garcia, as project manager in Oakland, and welcomed Margaret Hoffman as Outreach Coordinator in Portland, Oregon. These additions to the team have enabled the organization to enhance its programming, increase community engagement, and further its mission of promoting healing and dialogue through art and storytelling in workshops, and exhibitions.

Vision Quilt Oakland, CA

In 2023, Vision Quilt's partnership with Lighthouse and Lodestar successfully implemented workshops, an exhibition, and community dialogues in under-resourced Oakland communities, reaching over 150 youth and survivors. These initiatives provided a platform for participants to explore their experiences with gun violence and express their visions for a safer future. The Lighthouse and Lodestar exhibition attracted over 800 attendees, showcasing the transformative power of art. Following the exhibition, a documentary film was created to highlight the profound impact on parents, students, teachers, and the broader community.

Additionally, the Youth Alive Summer workshops created a safe and supportive space for young people to engage in creative expression, fostering healing and empowerment. To enhance these efforts, Vision Quilt hired Diana Garcia as the Oakland Project Manager to lead and expand initiatives in the Oakland area. Diana's leadership has been instrumental in coordinating programs and strengthening community partnerships.

Vision Quilt has been working diligently to grow its capacity and strategize to better serve the community and address the pressing issue of gun violence. Through continuous efforts, we aim to expand our reach and provide more comprehensive support to those affected by gun violence, fostering resilience and promoting healing through the power of art and dialogue.

Marge Barrett-Mills

Marge Barrett-Mills is a Vision Quilt magic maker from Montague, Massachusetts. Marge documented the children killed in 52 separate school shootings in 2022. Her 18 x 24-inch Vision Quilts not only honor the children whose young lives were lost, but they honor the other children, teachers, school staff, first responders, bus drivers, families, and friends whose lives have been changed forever. Vision Quilt is deeply grateful for her work and will lend these quilts to other organizations who want to offer healing and calls to action to end gun

violence in the U.S.




















Vision Quilt Portland, OR

In 2023, Vision Quilt moved its offices to Portland, Oregon with its outreach efforts headed by retired attorney, Margaret Hoffmann.

New partners in Portland include BIPOC-led nonprofits including P:ear, an organization that builds positive relationships with homeless youth through education, art, recreation and job training to affirm personal worth and create more meaningful and healthier lives. P:ear's resident artist, Kanani Miyamoto has been engaging the youth in creating Vision Quilt art. The first panel done by one of their youth was a drawing of a hammer and a rose which the artist entitled "Rebuilding Rose City".

Other collaborations are with <u>Don't Shoot Portland</u> (DSP) an arts organization that promotes social justice, founded and run by Teresa Rainford and Taishona Carpenter. Vision Quilt will participate in DSP's Juneteenth weeklong program where local Portland youth learn about Black history, activism, and racism. Vision Quilt is also collaborating with <u>Lines For Life</u>, a group engaged in initiatives to improve crisis services, and advance mental health and suicide prevention.

Financial Summary

In 2023, Vision Quilt received a Direct Community Grant from the City of Oakland and Councilmember Treva Reid, which facilitated workshops with Youth Alive! in 2024. This grant is crucial for expanding our reach and providing safe, creative spaces for young people to express their experiences and foster healing. Additionally, we received funding from Lighthouse Community Public Schools to revise the "Addressing Gun Violence" (AGV) curriculum and produce a documentary film.

The funding from Lighthouse Community Public Schools enabled us to film the process and impact of Vision Quilt at Lighthouse and Lodestar Middle Schools. The documentary showcased our workshops and the resulting exhibition and highlighted the profound effects on parents, students, teachers, and the broader community. The finale exhibition, viewed by over 800 people, demonstrated the transformative power of art in addressing gun violence and promoting community healing.

Overall, these financial contributions have been critical in expanding Vision Quilt's programming and outreach. They allowed us to organize 12 workshops with Lighthouse Community Public Schools, reaching 150 students, and conduct impactful community dialogues. The funds supported curriculum development, film production, and general operational costs, enhancing our ability to empower BIPOC communities in Oakland and beyond. We are deeply grateful for the support from our funders, partners, and the community, which has enabled us to continue our mission of preventing gun violence through art and dialogue.
